

INTRODUCTION

Throughout 2024, Museum Strathroy-Caradoc saw many successful exhibits, programs, special projects, and much more.

Five exhibits were shown in the main gallery and one pop-up exhibit was on display in the museum's lobby area. The main exhibits consisted of the continuation of "Grandma's Attic," which concluded mid-January. This exhibit was followed by a traveling exhibit "Cipher Decipher" from Ingenium, until the end of April. May brought a student art show, which was done in collaboration with the art students from SDCI. Our summer exhibit, "Strathroy-Caradoc: Through the Architect's Lens" saw many partners including the Strathroy Photography Club, local churches and businesses. The year ended with another traveling exhibit called "Broken Promises" which came from the Nikkei National Museum and Cultural Centre and led to a partnership with the Glencoe Historical Society for the local connection.

Throughout the year, many programs were held at the museum and off-site. We had three different artist workshops, seven Downtown Strathroy market visits, three walking tours, March break programs, school visits, special events, four weeks of summer camps and more.

Lastly, the successful execution of the Strathroy-Caradoc Poppy Project was considered one of 2024's highlights by both staff and the public. The project received an overwhelming positive response with over 10,000 donated poppies, over 20 different public programs, hundreds of volunteer hours, national and international recognition and participation, widespread news coverage, and much more. With the continual support of our local Legions and the community, plans to continue and enhance the project moving forward have already been made for 2025 and beyond.

Museum Advisory Committee

The Museum Advisory Committee (MAC) met five times throughout 2024, receiving reports and information from Museum staff. Members also attended a number of events throughout the year, including exhibit openings and programs. Lastly, various members attended 3 Collections Sub-Committee meetings.

Staffing

MSC saw the hiring of Samantha B. to fill the seasonal role of Museum Assistant. Sam was brought on from May to August to focus on summer programs, including camps and various adult programs, as well as assisting in exhibit prep and created a number of YouTube videos with another museum volunteer.

Volunteers and Co-op Students

In 2024, the museum was the recipient of over 450 volunteer hours from 12 individuals. Volunteers worked on various projects from collections work, media content, programming, and more. The Poppy Project saw approximately 100 people over the course of 6 days (estimating 300-400 hours total) attach poppies to netting. Our records do not include the number of hours people dedicated to the creation of poppies at home, but it is estimated to be in the thousands. One of these outstanding volunteers was Naelle C., who was here from Nice, France through a 6 month exchange program (November 2023 until April 2024) with the Rotary Club. Naelle created and facilitated programs, online material, assisted in the collection, assisted in the Poppy Project, and more. Lastly, this year the museum also welcomed two co-op students, one from Nipissing University's Schulich School of Education, the other from Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School. The students attributed nearly 300 hours of work to the museum focusing mainly on education and programming related content.

Museum staff applied for a number of grants that allowed the museum to bring in traveling exhibits and displays, host new programs, and continue other museum operations.

Strathroy Middlesex Museum Foundation

Throughout 2024, new members were recruited for the Strathroy Middlesex Museum Foundation and a number of projects received funding. The Foundation ran their first event since the COVID-19 shutdowns, and set up a new Chess Club to run at the Museum once a month starting in 2025. In December, the Foundation informed museum staff of their decision to dissolve with the remaining funds to enter into a Trust for the Museum. Official dissolution of the Foundation is scheduled to take place in 2025.


Redesign of fish tank display into "Sydenham River" and the addition of new fish.

Education / Programming

Throughout 2024, Museum staff developed and executed a number of successful programs for both children and adults. These ranged from exhibit opening nights, artist events, walking tours, market appearances, summer camps, murder mystery parties, school visits, and many more.

Participant Feedback

In the winter semester, the museum accepted a co-op student from Nipissing University's Schulich School of Education. The student focused on education programs and content, and was able to create a full week of March Break kids camp.

Museum staff continued relationships with Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School and Strathroy-Caradoc Christian School (S.C.C.S). During the Fall semester, we hosted one Co-op student From Holy Cross, who worked on various projects including collections, exhibit, marketing, programing and more. Most notable projects involves content and programming relating to the poppy project, as well as creating content for the Museum's YouTube channel.

The position of Sam B. as the Museum Assistant from May-August allowed for the increase in summer programing including adult program, market visits, and kids camps, which saw near 20% increase in number of campers from 2023. Through camps, a new partnership was formed with EarlyON through their Tales and Trails program, where campers stories based on artifacts was displayed at Alexandra Park in September.

There were 21 programs relating to the Poppy Project throughout 2024. These included poppy making sessions, attaching sessions and eight special Remembrance programs during installation. Overall, programs saw over 350 volunteer and participants at these events.




Middlesex Heritage Trail – Updates on the Middlesex Heritage Trail signs located throughout the Municipality. To be installed in 2025.




