

## **OVERVIEW**

In 2023, Museum Strathroy-Caradoc (MSC) began brainstorming ideas to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Strathroy Cenotaph in 2024, and fell in love with the idea of a community driven project like a large-scale poppy installation. Spearheaded by the Museum Curator, Michelle Wright, the project began to take shape with the assistance of other municipal staff including Crystal Loyst, Kait Topham, Len Taverner, and Jessy Van der Vaart. After obtaining permission from Dominion Command for the use of the poppy image, MSC, along with the rest of the Community Services department and the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 116, officially announced the Strathroy-Caradoc Poppy Project on Remembrance Day of 2023.

MSC asked the community to create over 3000 knitted or crocheted poppies that would be attached to netting and cascade down the front of Town Hall, located beside the Strathroy Cenotaph. With the involvement of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 251 confirmed in March, staff developed plans for an installation near the Caradoc Cenotaph in Mount Brydges. The 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary for the Mount Brydges Cenotaph took place in 2020 but unfortunately, due to COVID-19, celebrations were minimal. Staff developed plans for an installation there and asked for additional poppies. Additionally, staff reached out to Royal Canadian Legion Branch 510 in Melbourne to discuss the inclusion of an installation for their cenotaph, however in June of 2024, members moved forward with their own project.

The Museum developed the poppy pattern according to the trademarked guidelines and shared it through physical handouts available at the Museum, on the Museum's website, and tutorial videos on the Museum's YouTube channel. Local news outlets, including MyFM, Keepin' it Local, and Strathroy Neighbours, also promoted the project. From December 2023 to April 2024, ten drop-in sessions were held at the museum and at Branch 251 with staff available to assist volunteers with their poppies.

By the end of April, nearly 8000 poppies had been donated. Museum staff asked the community to bring in any remaining poppies they had by the end of May so that they could work on expanding the project. By October 1<sup>st</sup> the museum had counted over 10,000 poppies, more than tripling the original goal. To account for the extra poppies MSC adjusted to expand the project, set aside ones for future repairs and potentially creating other installations.

Throughout October, MSC hosted six Attaching Days, where over 100 volunteers, including municipal staff, came out to attach poppies to the netting. Roughly 4000 poppies were attached for 2024's display. With 6000 more poppies in storage, MSC has been working on plans to expand the installation for 2025.

Both installations were installed November 1, 2025 and remained up until after Remembrance Day. During this period, MSC developed a series of events for the 11 Days of Remembrance. Wright was also invited to speak at the Strathroy Remembrance Day Ceremony about the project.



This project was made possible with the assistance of The Royal Canadian Legion and our local Branches. The Poppy has stood as a national symbol of Remembrance since 1921, and it is the recognized symbol for the Legion's Poppy Campaign, which raises funds to support Veterans and their dependents. The Poppy Design is a trademark of The Royal Canadian Legion (Dominion Command) and was used with permission for the two installations near the cenotaphs.

## **VOLUNTEERS**

This project was made possible thanks to the efforts of volunteers. In total 10,152 poppies were donated to the museum with an estimated 7000 hours for creation of poppies. While the majority came from our community and Southwestern Ontario, packages and support also came from Toronto, Ottawa, Peterborough, Kingston, Calgary, New Brunswick, New York (USA), Maine (USA), London (England), The Netherlands, Nice (France), and more.

Volunteers not only made poppies at home, but participated in Poppy Workshops at MSC and Legion Branch 251. These workshops were led by Wright to assist those learning and to create a space for those who wanted to connect with others working on the project. These workshops concluded in April when the goal of 3500 poppies was reached. Volunteers returned in October over six days to help attach poppies to the netting. Throughout these attaching days, other municipal staff joined volunteers to assist in this process.

Not everyone that donated gave their names for recognition; therefore, the names listed here do not encompass everyone who helped make this project happen.
